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# THE RIGHT (WAY) TO QUOTE ...

- What "work" does including a quote do?
  - show's the author is engaging with the discourse
  - builds credibility, giving the author the right to "speak" to that discourse

- locates who to reward/punish
- shows thoughtfulness

# LIKE A GOOD SANDWICH A GOOD QUOTE HAS MANY INGREDIENTS.

- top bread signal in
- condiments why the quoted author is important
- meat quote itself
- lettuce citation —
- bottom bread restating/explanation



# TOP BREAD SIGNALING IN

How can you hold a sandwich without the top bread?

- signaling in let's everyone know a quote is coming.
- Example: When reading articles on Malcolm X . . .
- Example: Gee covers the idea of mushfaking late in the article when he says . . .



### (CONDIMENTS) BUILDING AUTHORITY

Like mustard can add to the flavor of a meat, so you must add authority to your author. Who else is going to speak for them? Also, it shouldn't be overpowering like having too much mayo.

- Example: noted literacy theorists James Paul Gee states . . .
- Example: Malcolm X, a
   prominent civil rights leader
   of the 60s, shows us . . .
- Example: A prominent educational reformer, Paulo Fierre, claims . . .



# MEATS QUOTING

Like there are different types of meats, there are different types of quotes. Each depends on you the type of sandwich you need....

 summary- use when overly complex but complexity is not needed

paraphrase - use when there
 is overly complex language,
 when necessary to "filter"
 from one discourse to
 another

parenthetical - use when getting it right and specific counts

- paraphrase use when there is overly complex language, when necessary to "filter" from one discourse to another
- Example: Fierre levels his claims at contemporary models of literacy education claiming that such systems deny and oppress human beings.\*

# **LETTUCE**CITATION

Like lettuce in real life, no one notices or asks for it but everyone recognizes it when it's not there.

- different citation styles require different citations (APA = Science, MLA = Humanities, etc.
- Each has a set of "values" to it's discourse that you can see from the citation format.
- Which is which?
- Which values do you see?
